From the Manse



During my summer travels to various places around Europe, I was struck by an interesting fact – often a central attraction in any large city or town would be a church or cathedral. Over the holiday I have visited a variety of churches, some very large and busy and some small and peaceful. In each place, there was an unmistakable sense of history, but more than that, there is a sense of God and his people. The beauty of each spoke loudly of worship and devotion. The care given to these holy locations pointed towards a sense of their worth

and value to the worshipper. It is perhaps interesting in these days when fewer people attend worship that crowds still flock to gaze and to ponder on the devotion of believers.

As a student, I recall reading about a well-known church in York ministered by Rev David Watson. On Sunday morning, he recounted how during worship times, visitors to the city would come and stand at the back of the church simply watching the worship of the congregation. There were several occasions, he said, when those visitors would be so affected by the obvious love and praise of the people that they would ask how they could have that same experience in.

Our church and our worship are outward expressions of our inward faith and devotion. I want to thank all our wonderful church workers

their life. David Watson would explain that knowing Jesus was what really made the difference for how the church, its grounds and gardens are so well kept. In particular this year I want to congratulate the small group of ladies who have miraculously brought order back to the manse garden – your efforts in the promotion if this natural beauty is much appreciated.

As we plan for the new church year ahead, I want to invite you along to our various church groups and activities. However, it would be great if you would also

come with a friend. This session the Kirk Session will begin with its annual Saturday conference on the 7th of September. The theme this year will be connecting with the community. As usual, the Kirk Session invites any who are



interested in contributing to this strategic conversation to come and join them. We meet in the church hall from 10 am and aim to finish around 2 pm.

The ‘purpose’ of the church will be the subject covered in all three of our Bible discussion and prayer groups. These are on Wednesday afternoons from 2 pm until 3 pm from the 11th of September. The Church Develops

When Jesus died, he left behind the blue-print for life in his new community – the Church. In his teaching he had spelled out clearly all the principles they would require to live lives fit for the coming of the Kingdom. What he had not done was provide detailed answers to every possible question that might arise in different situations in the future. Nor had he given them detailed instructions about how their mission to go out into all the world and preach the gospel might be carried out.

Now with the coming of the Holy Spirit, he had given them the help they would need to translate his principles into everyday attitudes and practices. It was not going to be an easy job, however and some of the questions took a very long time to solve. None the less, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, it all became possible and in the New Testament we can see these problems being worked out.

J. B. Phillips in his modern translation of the New Testament refers to the Book of Acts as the “Young Church In Action” and he re-tells

Luke’s account of how the Church began to tackle the problems just referred to above. It is a thrilling and exciting story.

In our memory verses in this edition we will begin to pick out some of these stories and learn there what the Church of today might learn from these experiences of the infant Church of long ago.

AUGUST.

In the period after Jesus death and before his ascension, he commanded his followers to wait in Jerusalem till the Church received a special gift. That gift was the in-filling of the Holy Spirit, which came to them in the most dramatic fashion. They were all gathered together when suddenly a noise filled all the house. It was like the blowing of a mighty rushing wind. They saw what id described as tongues of fire descending on each of them and they all began to speak in other tongues. They spoke words they had not known, but which turned out to be languages understood by these who had gathered in Jerusalem for the festival. This was the moment when the Church was born and its great



mission was launched. Here now was Jesus teachings being put into practice and the work of translating his message into practical every-day Christian living being fulfilled.

Acts 2 Vs. 8

SEPTEMBER

In the first days of the Church, believers were persuaded that they should share all they had with one another and that they should distribute their gifts among those who had need. So impressive was the witness of the disciples, in their lives, that the Church grew rapidly and many new converts were made. This, of course caused the work of caring for the needy to increase and put extra strain on the leaders who were trying to do both the job of teaching and preaching and the extra job of caring for the needy. Now, it seemed right to the Elders that this had to be dealt with. So, they called the Church together to see what could be done. It was decided that there should be a separation of duties and seven men known to be full of the Holy Spirit were chosen for the work of looking after the giving of help to the needy. This was not just a business decision, however, but one taken under the guidance of the Spirit. It established a new group of workers (we might call the deacons) and it was an early example of how Jesus teachings on love and caring could be translated into everyday practice, through God's guidance.

Acts 6 Vs. 3&4

“Brothers. Choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them and we will give our attention to prayer and the ministry of the word.”

OCTOBER

The infant Church was Jewish. Jesus had preached to the Jews and had called Jews to be his disciples. It is most likely that things might have stayed that way if God had not intervened through the Spirit. The Book of Acts tells us that there was a Roman Centurion called Cornelius who was very devout and a believer. One afternoon he had a vision and God spoke to him. The angel in the vision told Cornelius that God had heard his prayers and knew of his devotion. He was instructed to take men and go to Joppa and bring back a man named Peter. This Peter was, of course the Apostle. Now this was going to cause problems, for the Jews did not have religious dealings with the Gentiles. However, God had other ideas! At about the same time Peter was praying, he was hungry and while he waited for his meal he fell into a trance. In this vision he saw a sheet coming down from heaven. On it were all sorts of reptiles and birds. Peter then heard a voice that said to him to get up and kill and eat, but Peter could not do this because many of the creatures on the great sheet were forbidden to him under the law. Peter said “I can't eat Lord, for I have never eaten anything impure or unclean” “Don't call anything I have made impure or unclean” the voice said. After this had happened three times, Peter woke and was wondering what the vision had all been about. Just then the deputation arrived from Cornelius. Here was a problem, here was someone Jews considered impure wanting to become a believer within the Church. How should Peter react? He felt he now understood the vision of the sheet. It was saying that although Cornelius was a Gentile, he was not unclean for God was calling him. In the end Peter was persuaded by the Holy Spirit that he should baptise Cornelius because God had called him and Peter could not reject what God had done. So the baptism went ahead. This was a mighty step forward for the Church. It laid the foundation for a Church composed equally of Jews and Gentiles and opened the door to the mission of translating the principals of Jesus into every-day living.

Dear fellow members of the Church of Scotland,

In May, the General Assembly approved the work of the Special Commission and the Radical Action Plan. It was overwhelmingly agreed that we needed reform in many areas of our life and that we couldn't postpone the decision to act any longer. That change process has already begun and I am writing to ask for your prayers.



At the GA a new Trustee body of 12 people was elected, and they have been meeting regularly since they were appointed. The Trustees are led by the Very Rev Dr John Chalmers and the Vice Convener is an elder and Session Clerk, Mrs Norma Rolls. To provide continuity from the Special Commission, James McNeill, an elder, serves as the Administrative Trustee.

When presenting the Radical Action Plan on behalf of the Council of Assembly, Dr Sally Bonnar, concluded her presentation in these words:

"Trust will be of foundational importance. We are not them and us ...only us together. Even together we don't have all or even many of the solutions and that only by listening to God and trusting our brothers and sisters will we have any hope of success. And finally we need a total reliance on the living God... That is why within the plan we call once again for the church to pray, for a season of prayer which will be a time of reflection and preparation across the church".

The General Assembly agreed to have a season of prayer for this process of change from September to December. Many have already been praying. Prayer resources and information will be provided but I am writing with a specific prayer request.


An advert has gone out and applications received for the new post of Chief Officer. The person appointed will work very closely with the new Trustee body to implement the decisions of the GA. **Next Monday, 12 August, the first round of interviews will be held to fill this vacancy.**

Pray for discernment and wisdom for the interview group, and pray for the candidates that they will be enabled to present a full and honest picture of their potential for undertaking such a task.

Pray for the skills and relationships that are needed by the Trustees and for a good and effective relationship with the new Chief Officer.

Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus

In Philadelphia, during the great revival of 1858, over 5000 gathered together to hear Rev. Dudley Tyng preach. As people gathered for this noonday prayer meeting, he used this opportunity to plead earnestly for each to “go now, ye that are men, and serve the Lord.” It is said that over a thousand expressed a desire to become a Christian before the end of that meeting. Just a few days later he left his study for a moment and went out to the barn to check on a mule he had harnessed to a machine that was shelling corn. When he patted the mule on his head, his sleeve caught in the cogs of the wheel and his arm was frightfully torn. His injury led to complications and a painful illness which resulted in his death. As he was dying, his father asked him if he had any message for his fellow ministers in the revival. He replied, “Tell them to stand up for Jesus.”

It was these words that inspired Dr. George Duffield, Jr. to preach a memorial service for his late friend. He chose as his text Ephesians 6:14 “Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness.” As a climax to the thought of the sermon he shared a hymn that he had written based on Tyng’s dying words.

George Duffield Jr. (September 12, 1818 – July 6, 1888) was an American Presbyterian minister and hymnodist.

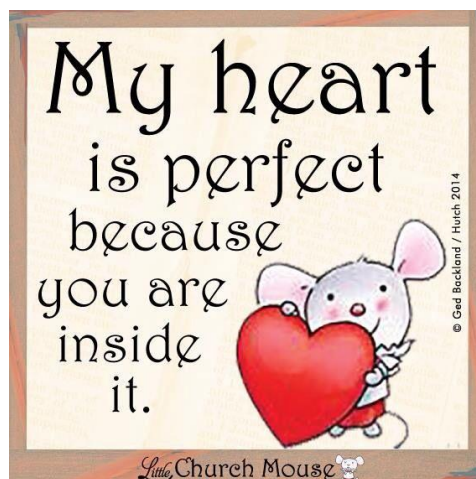


He was born on September 12, 1818, the fifth such **George Duffield**. His father was also a Presbyterian minister, George Duffield IV (1794-1868). His grandfather was George A. Duffield III (1767-1827). His great-grandfather, George Duffield II was chaplain to the Continental Congress. His great-grandfather George D. Dunfield, was a native of Belfast.

He graduated from Yale College in 1837 and the Union Theological Seminary in New York. He was a pastor from 1840 to 1869 at numerous cities including Brooklyn, New York; Bloomfield, New Jersey; Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Adrian, Michigan; Galesburg, Illinois; Saginaw City, Michigan; Ann Arbor, Michigan and Lansing, Michigan. He married and had a son, minister Samuel Willoughby Duffield. He died on July 6, 1888 and was buried at Elmwood Cemetery, Detroit, Michigan.

Duffield was known as a zealous advocate of abolition and Union causes during the U.S. Civil War. Upon the tragic death of another abolitionist and friend, he shared in a sermon, "I caught its inspiration from the dying words of that noble young clergyman, Rev. Dudley Atkins Tyng, rector of the Epiphany Church, Philadelphia, who died about 1854. His last words were, 'Tell them to stand up for Jesus: now let us sing a hymn.' As he had been much persecuted in those pro-slavery days for his persistent course in pleading the cause of the oppressed, it was thought that these words had a peculiar significance in his mind; as if he had said, 'Stand up for Jesus in the person of the downtrodden slave.' (Luke 5:18)"

The phrase “Ye that are men now serve Him,” continues to live on today through the text of the popular hymn “Stand Up Stand Up for Jesus.” Let these words echo as our battle cry against those that may oppose the cause of Christ

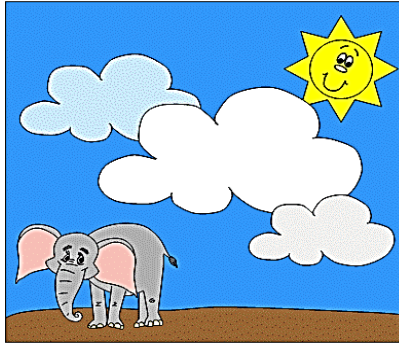

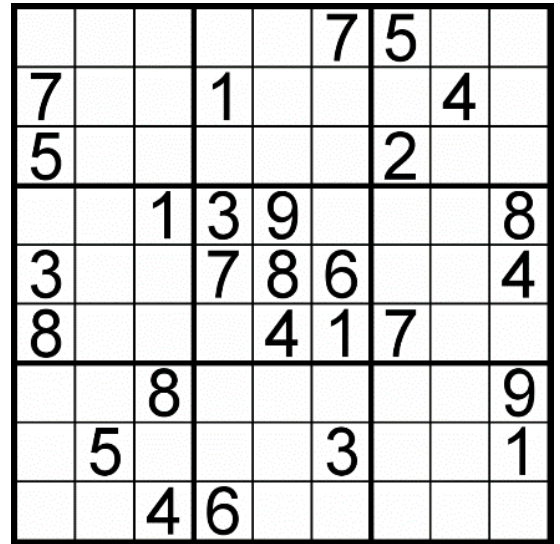

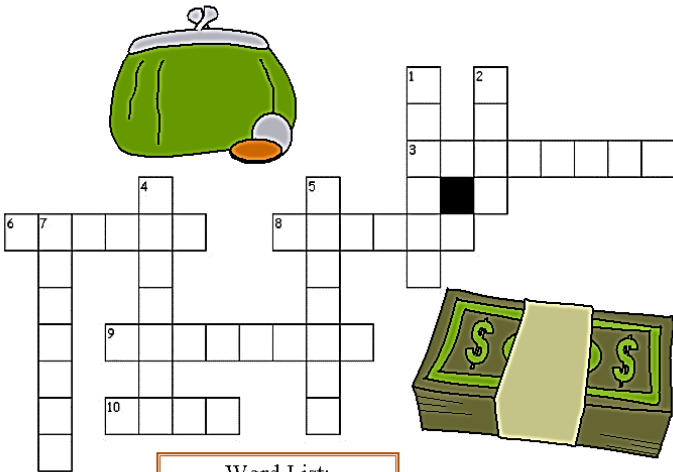
