Few would argue that holidays are a bad thing, except maybe the chronic workaholic, who perceives a good night's sleep a complete waste of time. Escaping from the normal routine is deemed essential if one is to survive in an ever demanding work environment Batteries need recharging!

In a past generation, when families were numerically larger and where money was scarce, a fortnight with the grandparents on the croft, being eaten alive by midges was seen as virtually next door to paradise!

But where did the word, holiday, come from? One Dictionary definition gives the following explanation, 'A period in which a break is taken from work or study, for rest, travel or recreation.' And derives from the Old English, 'Holyday.'

Israel of old had many 'holydays.' Passover and Day of Atonement, commemorated God's Gracious Salvation. Tabernacles, celebrated His rich and abundant harvest, and the 'holydays' were between two to seven days, with their focus being on communal thanksgiving and joyful worship.

The Sabbath, literally, 'Day of Rest' was deemed to be the most important of the 'holydays' and was intended to remind God's people that on the seventh day God rested from His work of creation. Sadly, by Jesus day, the Sabbath, God's good gift to His people had become so enmeshed in legalism that it had lost its sense of joy and celebration. A tailor, for example, if he was found to be carrying a

needle in his coat, was considered to have broken the Sabbath regulations, through conveying a tool of his trade, albeit inadvertently.

But how did the Jewish become the Christian Sabbath, Sunday or Lord's Day? You recall how Joseph, a member of the Jewish Council, not wishing to desecrate the Sabbath, requested that the body of Jesus be taken down from the cross and placed in a tomb, Luke 23:50-54. This took place on the Jewish Saturday, our Friday, so Jesus did not emerge from the tomb on the Sabbath, but on the following day. A special day that is spoken of in the New Testament as, 'the first day of the week' or, 'The Lord's Day' our Sunday.

If the Jewish Sabbath was a day of sorrow and deep sadness for the first disciples, the first Lord's Day was filled with rejoicing and victory songs. The day reminded and assured them that Jesus had the victory over sin, death and the grave. On this day they met as a church family, they broke bread, listened to God's Word being explained by the apostles, prayed together and gave an offering for God's work, Acts 2:42-47. & 1 Cor. 16:2.

Our 'Holyday' is the Lord's Day, because it took the death of Jesus on the cross to make it possible for God to bring eternal healing into our souls.

As we gather in God's House, be it the Anderson church building of in some far of exotic holiday destination on His 'Holyday' may we know the reality of Christ's victory, pres-

ence, power and renewal.

Loss and Damage

The climate crisis is making weather events, such as floods, storms and droughts, more common and more severe. The resulting loss of life, land and culture is a global scandal.

In southern Malawi, droughts and floods ravage the land. Crops are being destroyed and lives and being lost. With vital incomes wiped out, children can no longer go to school.



This is loss and damage.

The communities who experience the greatest loss and damage, have done the least to cause it.

At the COP27 climate talks in 2022, governments agreed to create a fund to compensate communities hit by climate disasters. But the fund is still empty, and communities are still left to pay the bills for loss and damage. Meanwhile, the polluters who've created the crisis continue to grow rich. It's time for polluters to pay up. To make this happen, we need to rise up together and call on the UK Government to make polluters pay.

Why is loss and damage happening?

The world is getting hotter. Rising temperatures are creating more droughts, floods and other extreme weather events. This is because we continue to pump fossil fuels into the atmosphere, against all scientific advice, and while ignoring the experience of our global neighbours who live with the consequences every day.

What's the solution?

We must limit rising temperatures to minimise loss and damage. And we must stand with communities who are calling for compensation to rebuild their lives. At the COP27 climate talks in 2022, governments agreed to create a Loss and Damage fund that could do just that. But right now, the fund is empty. For too long, communities who experience loss and damage have been expected to pay the bill while polluters who cause loss and damage enjoy great wealth and generate massive profits.

It's time for the UK Government to make polluters pay.

The Right Rev Sally Foster-Fulton succeeded Iain Greenshields to become Moderator of the General Assembly in May.

She will leave her role as head of Christian Aid in Scotland to serve as the Kirk's ambassador at home and abroad for the next 12 months.

Before joining Christian Aid in 2016, Mrs Foster-Fulton convened the Church and Society Council and helped advance the Church's work on human rights, climate justice and support for people strug-



gling to overcome poverty in Scotland as well as overseas. In 2007, she was appointed associate minister at Dunblane Cathedral.

She also served as a chaplain at Falkirk and District Royal Infirmary and The Royal National Scottish Hospital in Larbert before being accepted as a candidate for ministry in the Church of Scotland. After she was ordained in 1999, Mrs Foster-Fulton spent four years as parish minister at Camelon Irving Parish Church in Falkirk.



The possible changes we face in the coming years are certainly unsettling but it occurs to me that this is far from the first time the Church has been facing difficulties.

In fact I would be bold enough to suggest that it is times when everything is settled, and there are no crises at all, that are the odd ones out for any healthy family of faith. We do not work in isolation from our brothers and sisters outside the Church, and the worlds of religion, politics, culture, and society necessarily interweave with one another as all are, in some ways, concerned with humanity and our various communities.

The future awaits us and we have the privilege of contributing to how the Church of Scotland will look in Kilsyth in coming years. But beyond the day-to-day tasks ahead we must never lose sight of why we are here, to share the Good News of the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Nothing is more important than that.
