Dear Friends,



"Pride comes before a fall '.... How many of us grew up with these words ringing in our ears? The phrase needed no explanation, for deep down we all knew its meaning. But how did that saying find its way into our forefathers' consciousness and why did they feel compelled to impress it upon the hearts and minds of the younger generations?

It could be that our spiritual fore-bearers knew their Bible far better than we do, and realised that life could be tough, with many disappointments encountered along the way. I think of Proverbs 16:18.... "Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall." Or, the well known passage from 1 Corinthians, ch.13, "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful."

If we delve back into Classical Greek philosophy and the teaching of the early Christian Church, we discover that pride, along with wrath, greed, lust, envy, gluttony and sloth were included in the concept of the 'Seven deadly sins.' Pride being considered as the most destructive of the group.

Yet, it is that very word that some vocal elements within society have borrowed and use to identify themselves, as they seek to promote a certain lifestyle and to 're-educate' our youth into adopting and supporting this so called, progressive ideology.

So what does the Scriptures have to say to us today on that very matter? For the answer, I must confess that I was drawn to the manse in Barvas, sometime in the mid to late seventies, when, as a Youth Fellowship we sang choruses to the accompaniment of crackly cassette tapes, one comes to mind,.... 'He hath shown thee O man what is good,' A couple of verses taken directly from Micah 6:8.

.... "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

There has never been a time when it was easy 'to walk humbly with your God' and the challenges we now face will always be there. But the marvel of Redeeming Grace is that God has revealed to us in His Living Word, that which is good for His people, but also for humanity as a whole.

'To do justice' basically means to act in a fair and equitable way, ensuring that everything one does is above board, unbiased and transparent, be that in government, business, community, church or family life. 'Loving kindness, or mercy 'as some translations render the phrase, is a practical expression of God's love, which may be readily shown to people who are easy to love, but less so, to the seemingly awkward. The ultimate example of this kind of kindness or mercy is wonderfully displayed in the life, suffering and death of Jesus on the cross; for no one deserves Salvation. Yet, because of God's 'Loving kindness,' or mercy, and Christ's sacrifice, sinners have the opportunity to be saved if they accept Christ Jesus as their Saviour.

Hebrews 11, powerfully reminds us that without faith it is impossible to please God. The chapter presents us with many examples of OT believers, whose faith and life commended then to God. In Gen.5:24. Enoch is specifically mentioned because he did not taste death, but was taken directly to glory. A Christian preacher of a past generation, described Enoch as taking a daily walk with God, with whom he communed as friend to friend. One day, God said, 'Today, my friend, we're not returning to your home, rather, we're going to my house.' The ultimate goal of walking with God, said Jesus, "In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." John 14:2-3

A Christian author, Peter Lewis by name, once wrote, "As believers, we live in a world whose atmosphere is often inimical to our faith. We have to survive spiritually in an alien environment and can only do so if we take from a regular prayer-life and reading of God's word our spiritual oxygen into that environment with us.

A walk with God has its own atmosphere and brings its own strength and perspective into a world which has never made a life of faith easy for the Believer."

FAQs (frequently asked questions) about Lent and Easter

When does Lent begin in 2024?

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on Wednesday, February 14, 2024.

Why is Lent 40 days long?

Lent lasts for 40 days because Christ suffered in the desert for 40 days.

How is the date of Ash Wednesday determined?

Ash Wednesday always falls six and half weeks before Easter.

When is Fat Tuesday?

Fat Tuesday is the final day before Lent. In 2024, it takes place on February 13th. Fat Tuesday is also known as Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day.

How is the date of Easter determined?

Easter is a moveable feast as opposed to a fixed date each year. Easter being celebrated on the Sunday following the first full moon of spring (March 21 or later) dates back to the Council of Nicea in 325.

How long is Lent?

Lent lasts 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday, excluding Sundays. Sundays are an important part of Lent, but we do not include them in the "40 days" because on every Sunday we remember and celebrate the Resurrection of Christ.

When is Palm Sunday?

Palm Sunday, the last Sunday during Lent, takes place on March 24 in 2024. It signifies Jesus's triumphant return to Jerusalem after spending 40 days and nights in the desert

When is Good Friday?

Good Friday takes place between Palm Sunday and Easter, and will occur on March 29, 2024, one day after Maundy Thursday.

When is Easter in 2024?

Easter falls on Sunday, March 31, 2024.





Lent and Easter

For many of us, the life changing significance of Easter is all too easily obscured amidst the marketing messages for chocolate or the antics of the Easter bunny (not to mention monkeys), and it's easy to lose sight of the profound message that Easter carries.

The act of giving up something during Lent is intended to create space for spiritual growth. The idea is that by removing distractions and worldly attachments, we can devote more time and energy to prayer, meditation, and contemplation of our relationship with God, however if you've given something up (food or drink) then it's all too easy for the focus to shift on to the act of abstinence itself rather than the spiritual discipline. Easter then turns into a deadline or target date for when you can over indulge rather than an opportunity to reflect on the personal growth, self-awareness, and spiritual insights gained during the Lenten season. It becomes a time to assess the impact of the chosen abstinence on their lives and to appreciate the journey of self-discipline.

We must never forget that Easter, at its core, is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is a pivotal moment in Christian faith, marking the triumph of life over death and symbolizing hope, redemption, and forgiveness. As we approach this sacred season, it's essential for Christians to reflect on the profound impact of the Easter story on their lives and to rekindle the flame of passion for their faith.

We suggest some ways you might go about this:

Reflect on Personal Faith: Take a moment to reflect on your own faith journey. Consider the ways in which your beliefs have shaped your life and provided guidance in times of challenge. Rediscover the personal significance of Easter by revisiting the scriptures that recount the resurrection.

Engage in Prayer and Meditation: Dedicate time to prayer and meditation during the Lenten/Easter season. This spiritual discipline can help reignite a sense of awe and gratitude for the sacrifice made on the cross. Seek a deeper understanding of the love and grace extended through the resurrection.

Preparation for Sharing:

Know Your Testimony: A powerful way to share your faith is through your personal testimony. Take some time to articulate the story of your journey with Christ – the before, the encounter, and the transformation. This authentic narrative can resonate deeply with those who may be seeking spiritual connection. We heard only a few weeks ago from the Gideons about how, if you're in tune with what God is saying, amazing opportunities

to share and help others may arise. Be prepared to share your faith at all times – you never know when the right words could help someone else. There's nothing worse than rueing the fact that you missed an opportunity because you weren't prepared.

Stay Informed: Familiarise yourself with the foundational principles of your faith. Being well-informed about the central tenets of Christianity equips you to address questions and engage in meaningful conversations with others. Knowledge is a powerful tool in conveying the richness of your beliefs.

Practice Humility and Empathy: Approach conversations with humility, recognizing that faith journeys differ. Be empathetic and open-minded, creating a space where others feel comfortable sharing their perspectives. A gentle and respectful demeanour can foster constructive dialogue.



In August 2012 Josh Littlejohn and Alice Thompson cofounded the Social Bite, a chain of cafes that provides employment and free food to homeless and vulnerable people.

In 2016, he co-founded a social enterprise beer company called Brewgooder, where the profits go towards providing clean water. The brewery set out an aim of providing clean


drinking water for one million people in five years.

By 2018 they were able to fund building the Social Bite Village from reclaimed wasteland in Edinburgh to provide shelter and support for up to 20 homeless people at any one time.

In December 2019, they launched the World's Big Sleep Out, which took place in 52 cities including London, Edinburgh, New York, Delhi and Hong Kong.

In 2023, Social Bite opened the doors to a new Glasgow coffee shop on Sauchiehall Street. To date, 3,175 customers have paid forward a coffee or meal for others. By the end of 2023, the Social Bite Village in Edinburgh had supported more than 100 people who had experienced homelessness.
